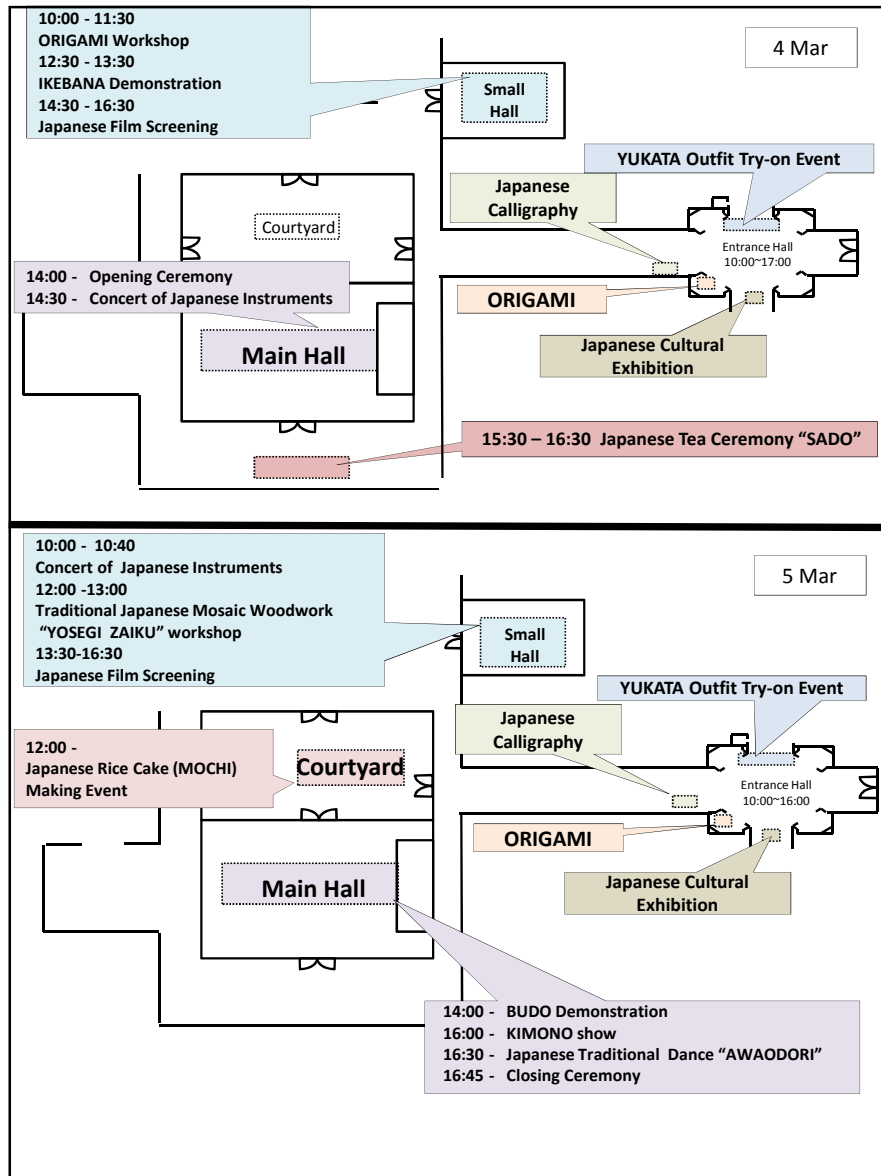

About Japanese Culture

Koto is a long Japanese board-zither having 13 silk strings and movable bridges. The body of the instrument is made of paulownia wood.

Shakuhachi is a Japanese end-blown bamboo flute. It was originally derived from the Chinese *xiao* in the 8th century.

YOSEGI ZAIKU is a type of traditional Japanese mosaic woodwork which originated during Japan's culturally rich Edo Period.

Kimono is traditional garment worn by Japanese people from the Hakuho period (645–710) up to now. **Yukata** is made of lighter material for the summer climate.

Awa-odori is a unique style of traditional Japanese dance from the Shikoku island of Japan. *Awa* is an old name for the region where the dance was created.

Sado is traditional Japanese tea ceremony, rooted in the principles of Zen Buddhism and founded upon the reverence of the beauty in the daily routine of life.

Ikebana is classical Japanese art of flower arrangement; the meaning of the term was later extended to encompass all the various styles of Japanese floral art.

Origami is an intricate art of paper-folding, through which two- and three-dimensional objects are created in different colors and sizes.

Budo is Japanese martial art, which literally means "Martial Way." There are many styles of *budo*, such as *judo*, *kendō*, and *karate*, just to name a few.

Japanese Shodo is a type of calligraphy that requires special tools, such as brush (*fude*), ink-stick (*sumi*), mulberry paper (*washi*) and ink-stone (*suzuri*).

Mochi is Japanese rice cake made of sticky rice, *mochigome*. The rice is pounded into paste and molded into the desired shape. In Japan it is traditionally made in a ceremony called *mochitsuki*.
